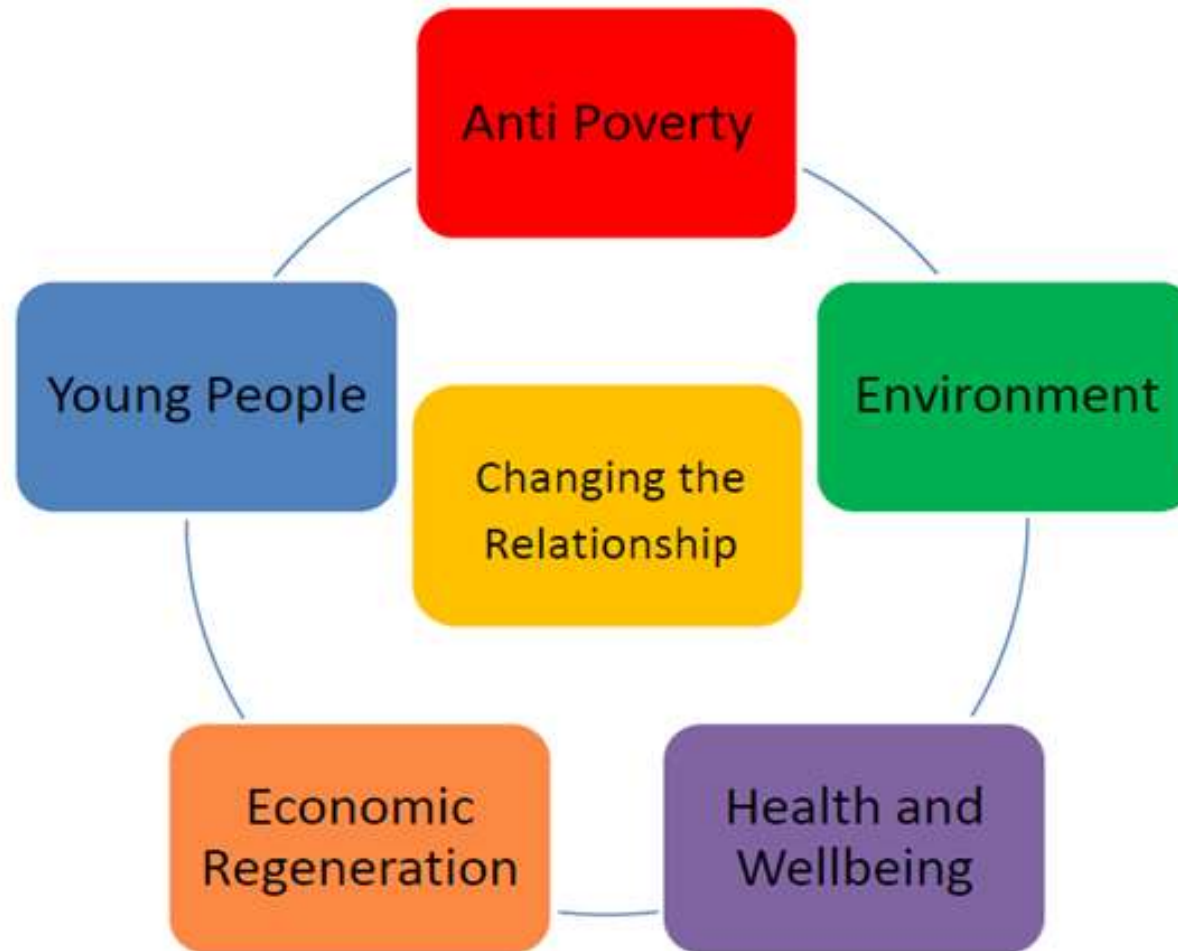

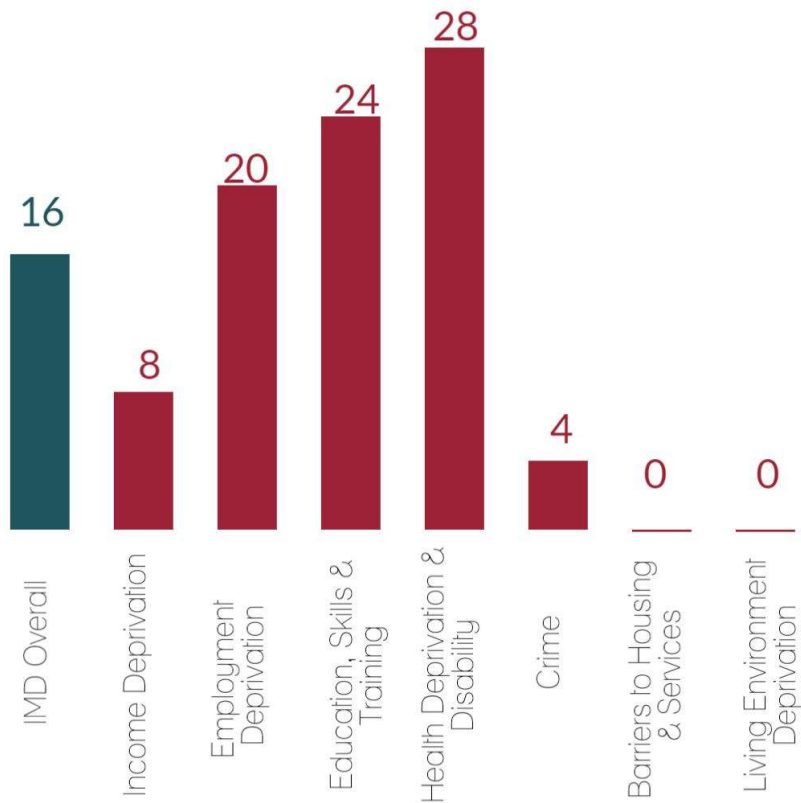
Demographics

- **Barnsley population = 237,843**
- **North Area Council population = 43,066 (2014 Mid-year population estimates)**
- **Age breakdown:** Under 16s 7,974 (18.5%), Working Age 27,084 (62.9%) and Over 65s 8,008 (18.6%).
- **Ethnic Minority:** 97.6% of people living in Barnsley are White. North Area is similar at 97.3% but there are some differences at ward level – Old Town is 95.7% and Darton West is 98.4%
- **Deprivation:** 21.8% of areas in Barnsley are amongst the 10% most deprived in England. · Within the North area Council in IMD 2015, there were 16% of areas amongst the 10% most deprived in England.

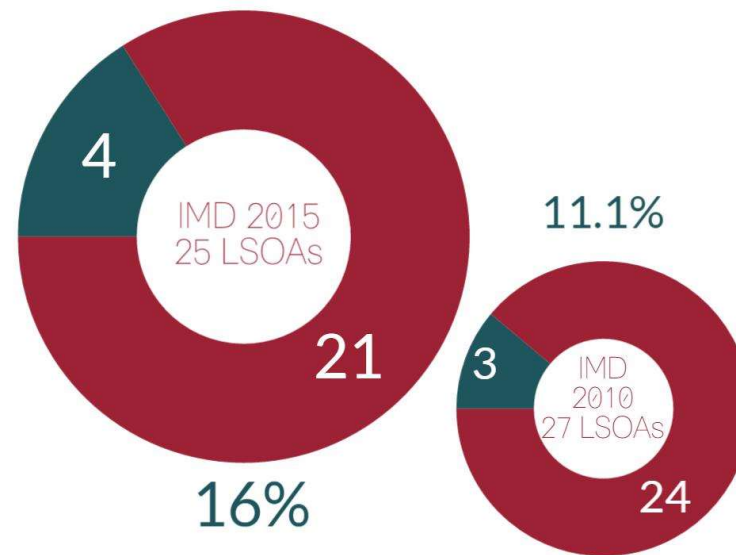

Percentage of North Area Council LSOAs in the Bottom 10% in England by Domain in IMD 2015

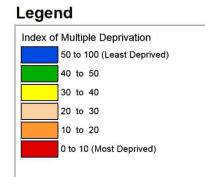
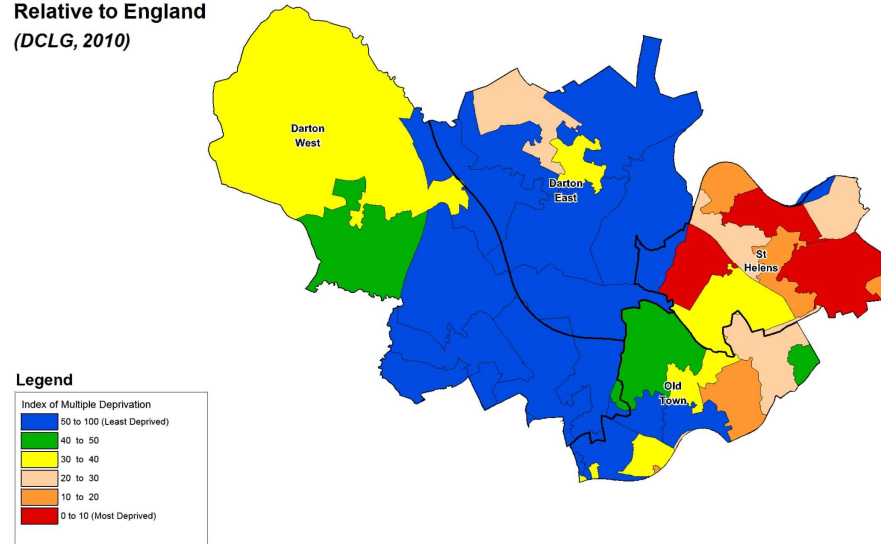


Proportion of North Area Council LSOAs in 10% Most Deprived in England

(DCLG, 2010)



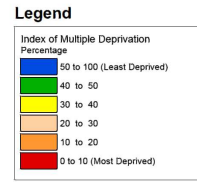
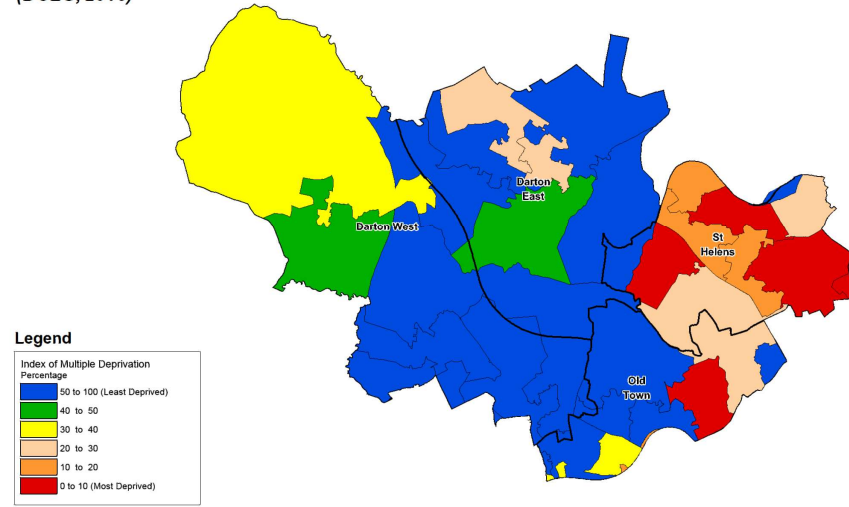

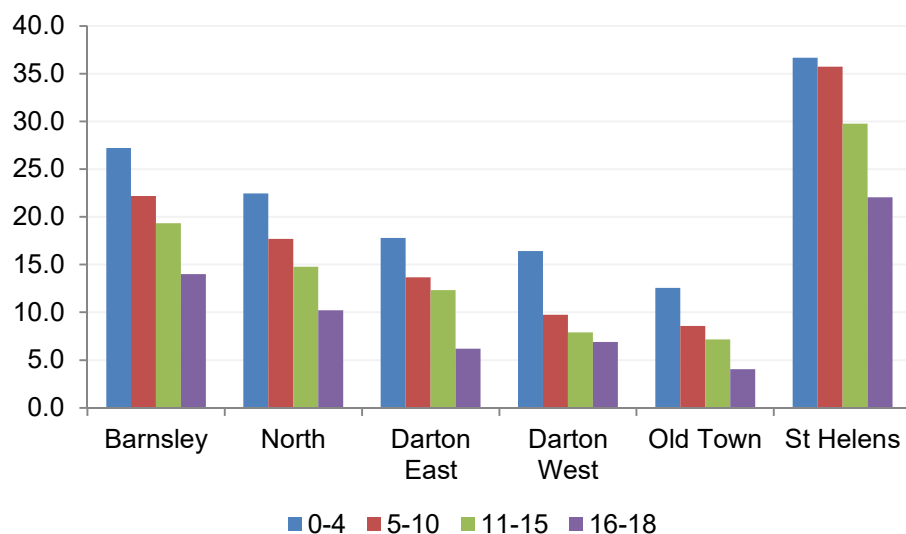

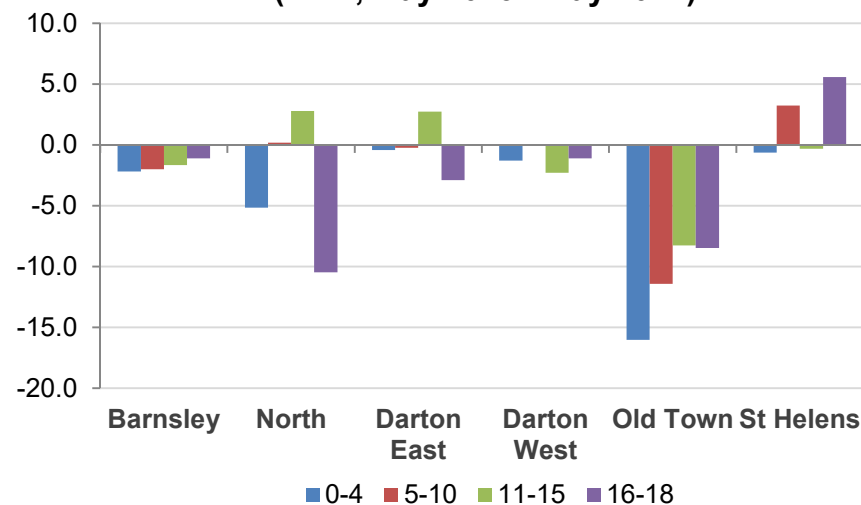
Anti Poverty

Anti Poverty

Child Poverty for children aged under 16:

In 2013 21% of North Area Council children aged under 16 live in low income families. This is lower than the Barnsley rate.

Child Poverty for all children:

20% of all North Area Council children live in low income families. This is lower than the Barnsley rate.

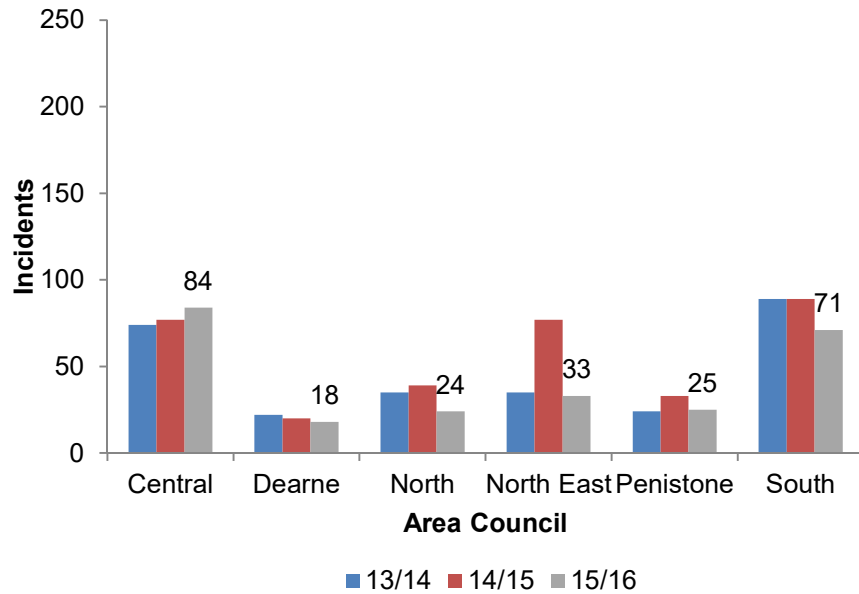
Anti Poverty

- **Fuel Poverty (2013):** 9.2% of households in Barnsley are estimated to be in Fuel Poverty this is lower than the regional (10.6%) and England average (10.4%).
- The percentage of households in fuel poverty across the borough has decreased from 10.9, in 2011 to 9.2% in 2013, a decrease has also been seen in the North Area from 10.0% in 2011 to 8.6% in 2013.
- In 2013 St Helens and Old Town had the greatest level of fuel poverty at 10.4% and 10.2% in the North Area, and Darton East had the lowest at 6.8%.

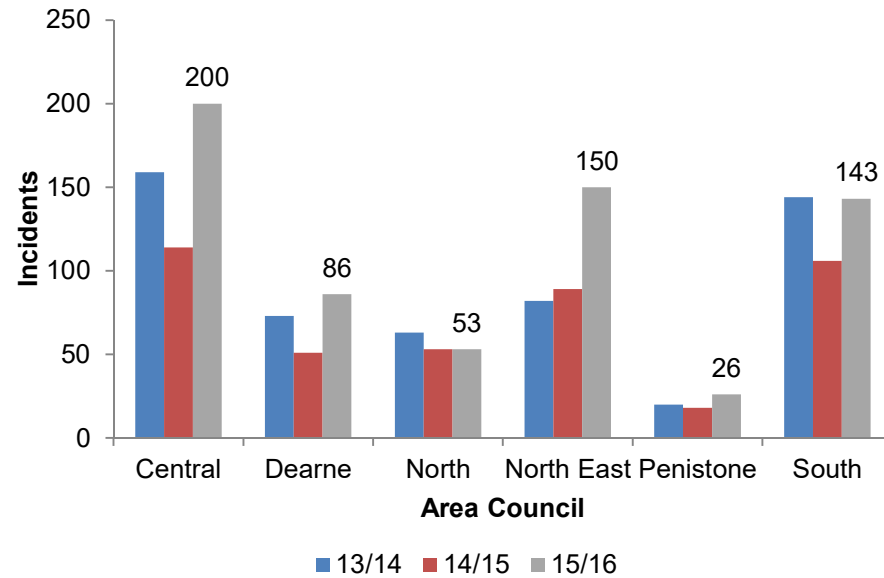

Dog Fouling Incidents (Neighbourhood Services)



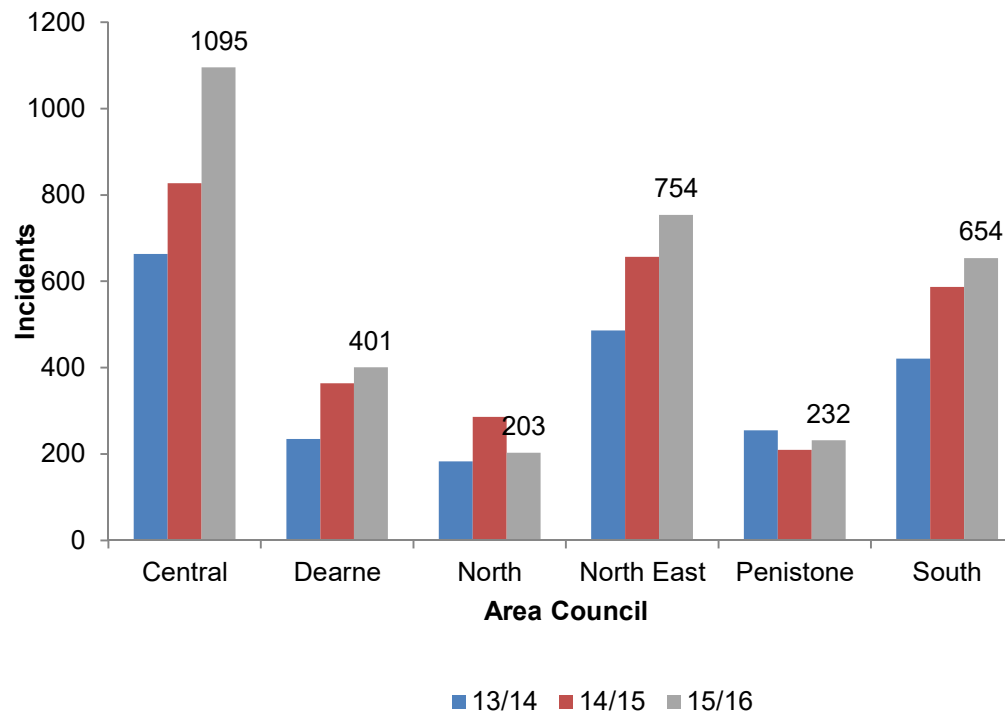
Litter Incidents (Neighbourhood Services)

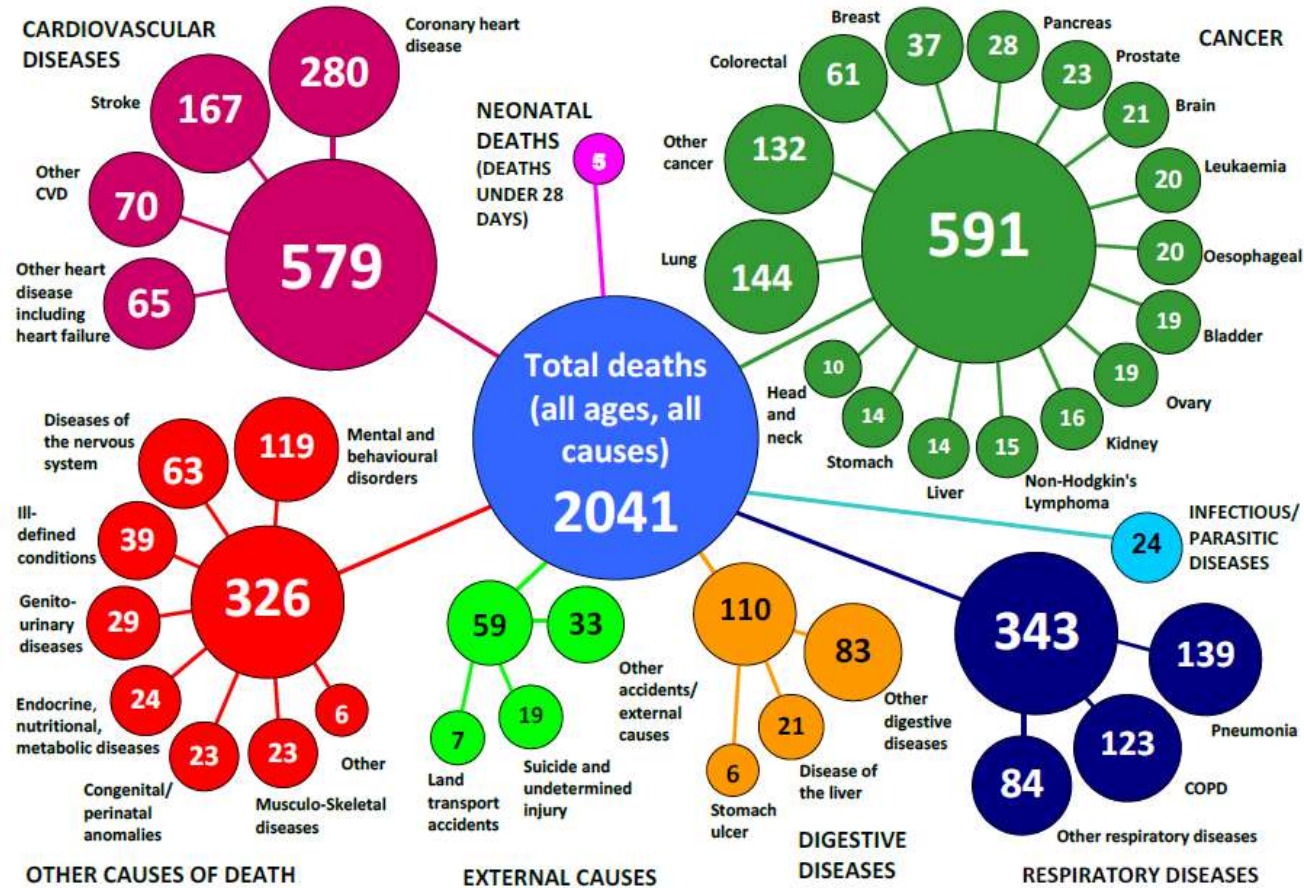
Fly Tipping has increased in Barnsley by over 40% since 2013/14 and has emerged as a key priority for environmental enforcement.

Fly Tipping Incidents (Neighbourhood Services)



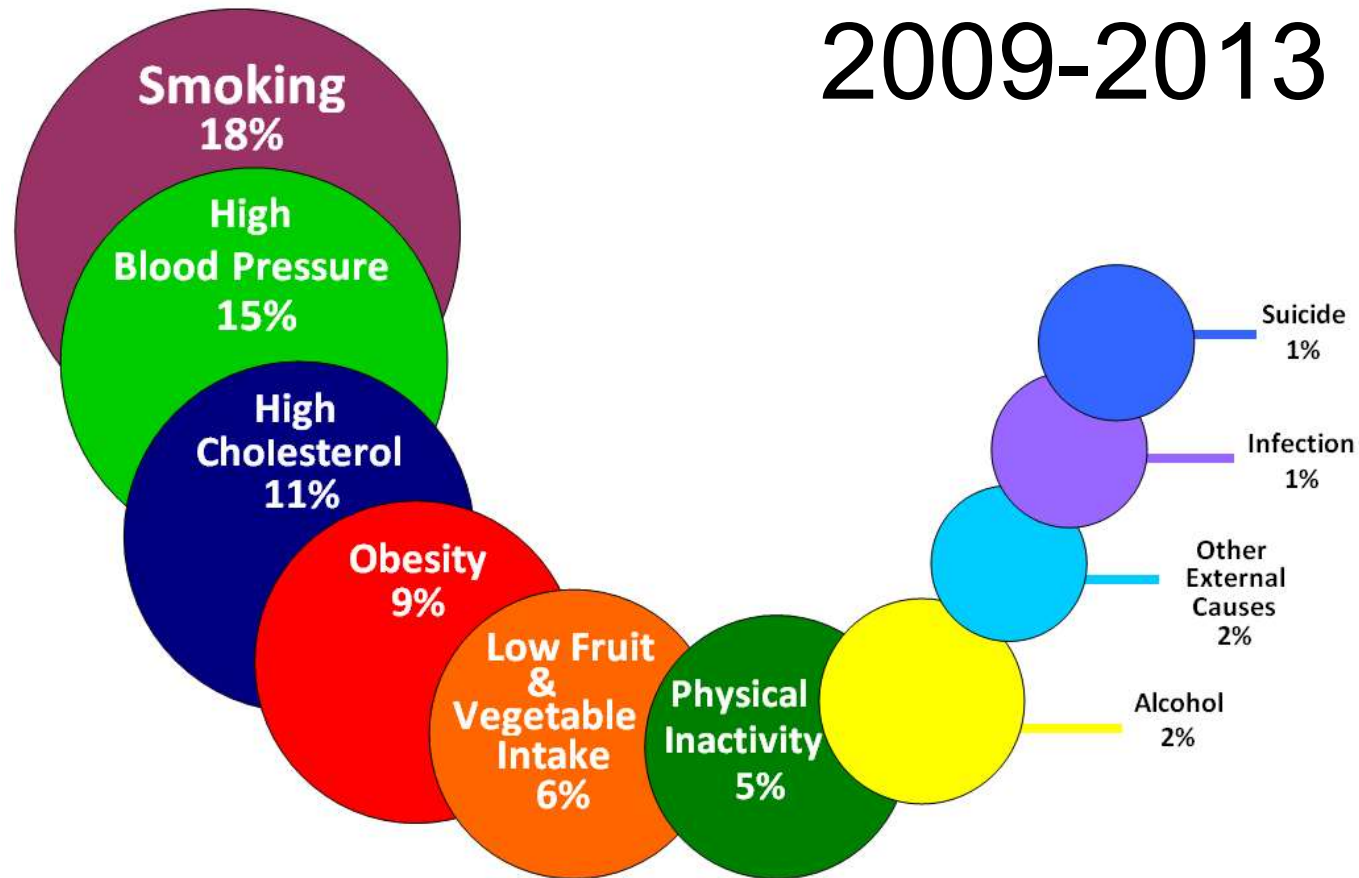
Causes of death 2009-2013

Health & Wellbeing

- **Smoking**
- In March 2015 smoking prevalence for over 18s was slightly lower in the North area (22.7%) than the Barnsley average (23.9%).
- In 2014/15 smoking in pregnancy in the North area was better than the Barnsley average (16.9% and 20.4% respectively).
- At ward level, St Helens has double the rate of smoking in pregnancy (30.9%) than the other wards in the North area (DE 15.3%, DW 15.6%, OT 16.3% - 3 year averages between 2012/13 to 2014/15)



Health & Wellbeing

Excess weight in 4-5 year olds:

There is a general upwards trend in the rate over the past few years.

Barnsley 22.2% (↑ 2.3%)

North 23.6% (↑ 2.3%)

St Helens 28.6% (↑ 6.9%)

Old Town 20.7% (=)

Darton E 23.8% (↑ 3.4%)

Darton W 16.5% (↑ 2.8%)

Excess weight in 10-11 year olds:

There is no consistent trend in the rate over the past few years.

Barnsley 33.6% (↑ 0.8%)

North 32.3% (↓ 2.2%)

Old Town 37.3% (↑ 6.6%)

St Helens 36.7% (↑ 2.2%)

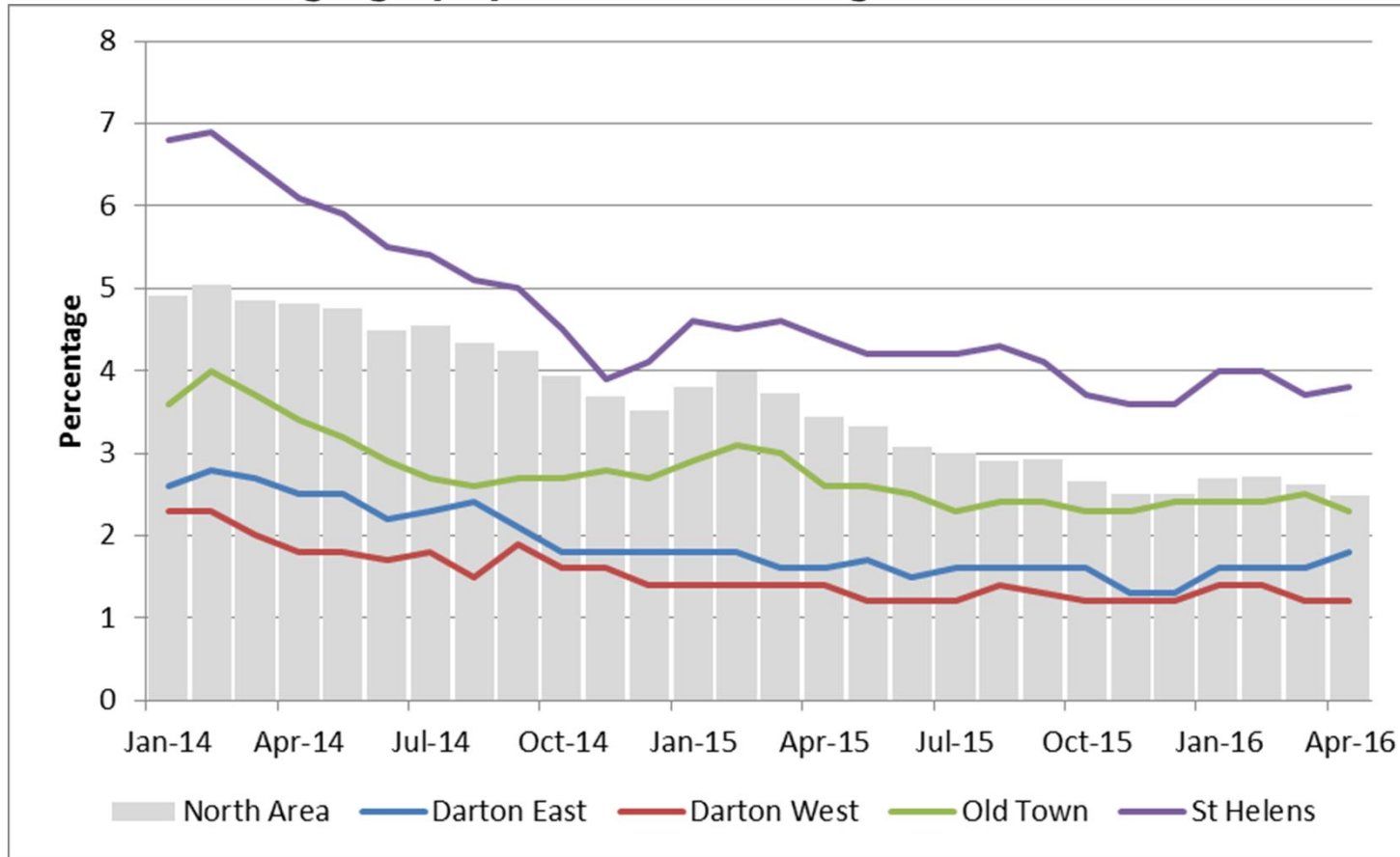

Economic Regeneration

- **New business start ups:** In 2015 there were 991 new business start ups across the borough, 187 of which were in North Area or 19%.
- The number of new start ups has been declining year on year in the North Area and across Barnsley since a peak in 2010 (246 and 1302 respectively).
- During this period the number of new start ups (as a percentage of all start ups) in the North Area and its wards has remained constant at between 18% and 19% for the North Area, 3% for St Helens and 5% for the other wards.














