# **Devolved Ward Budgets and Ward Alliance Funds**

## 1. Purpose of Report

1.1 This report updates the Central Council on progress in each Ward in expending the Devolved Ward Budgets and Ward Alliance Fund budgets.

#### 2. Recommendation

That each Ward in the Central Council area prioritises the efficient expenditure of the remaining Devolved Ward Budgets and Ward Alliance Funds.

#### 3.0 <u>Introduction</u>

3.1 As part of the decisions made by the Council (Cab.21.11.2012/6; Cab.16.1.2013/10.3; Cab13.2.2013/9 and Cab.8.5.2013/7.1) each Ward was given a Devolved Ward Budget of £20,000 and each Ward Alliance a fund of £10,000 for financial year 2013/14. The Devolved Ward budget has been available to commit since the beginning of the financial year while the Ward Alliance Fund becomes available once the Ward Alliance Priorities have been finalised after a community consultation exercise.

#### 4.0 Position Statement and Challenges

- 4.1 Appendix One breaks down the approvals etc to the end of October, 2013 for the Devolved Ward Budget. The accumulated commitment for the five Wards, as set out in the Appendix One, is £47,259.20 out of the £100,000 allocated. In addition, the Ward Alliance Fund monies have not become available and the total uncommitted budget remains £50,000.
- 4.2 In addition, there is the £7,000, per Ward, Public Health allocation which remains uncommitted (of which £2,000 was previously allocated to support the development of Neighbourhood Networks). The Appendix includes examples of possible projects for expending this allocation.



# Central Area Council (April 2013 - October 2013) Update





**Central** has committed £2,331.20 of its £20,000 Devolved Ward Budget allocation, to date £551.20 of this commitment has been charged to the Ward.



The pie chart below shows the committed spend in the Central Ward split into themes





The pie chart below shows the committed spend in the Dodworth Ward split into themes




**Kingstone** has committed £18,902 of its £20,000 Devolved Ward Budget allocation, to date £18,902 of this commitment has been charged to the Ward.



The pie chart below shows the committed spend in the Kingstone Ward split into themes




**Stairfoot** has committed £7750 of its £20,000 Devolved Ward Budget allocation, to date £390 of this commitment has been charged to the Ward.



The pie chart below shows the committed spend in the Stairfoot Ward split into themes




