Draft Area Plan priorities and next steps

1. Purpose of Report

- 1.1 To enable the South Area Council to rationalise ward and area-wide priorities, in order to identify which are suitable for budget investment by the Area Council.

2. Recommendation

- 2.1 That the South Area Council receive the report and agree the three Area Plan thematic priorities identified in section 4.

3. Introduction

- 3.1 At an extra Area Council Workshop session held in August 2013, members of the South Area Council were asked to identify priorities for each of the four wards within the geographic area, following a presentation of local datasets. It became apparent that there are a number of priorities that are applicable to more than one ward. This report aims to bring together these common themes in order to agree thematic priorities for the South Area Plan.

4. Key Consideration

- 4.1 It is important to note that the Area Council devolved budget is intended to be used to commission services that will address the three main corporate priorities, namely:

- Growing the economy
- Changing the relationship between the Council and the community
- Improving people's potential and achievement

- 4.2 In order to achieve these priorities 18 outcomes have been identified, which should help to inform decision making at Area Council level. These outcomes are set out in appendix 1 to this report.

5. Ward priorities as discussed at 1st August workshop session

- 5.1 At this workshop a presentation of South Area datasets by the Performance and Partnerships Team was followed by ward-based discussions, to enable members to examine previously discussed ward priorities in the light of this new data. Notes from these discussions can be found in the appendices to this report.

5.2 Following this, discussions took place to identify priorities that were common across the South Area.

The priority themes identified were:

- Opportunities for young people
- Business and the local economy
- Information and guidance

5.3 Within these thematic areas, a number of more specific issues were agreed as key to the improvement of the South Area, namely:

- 11 to 16 attainment
- Tackling poverty amongst all age groups
- Support for young people to reduce NEETs, including access to work, training, mentoring, and links to businesses
- Increasing inward investment and access to other sources of funding
- Contributing to the development of the Junction 36 Enterprise Zone
- Encouraging businesses and individuals to take responsibility for their own environment
- Locally based welfare/debt advice, possibly based on a 'roadshow' model
- A need to involve all partners fully, both statutory and voluntary

6. **Next steps**

5.4 It was agreed at the 1st August workshop that the next stage would be to examine the priorities outlined above in more detail, and in particular to identify those which could be:

- 1) Addressed at ward level, and may attract funding from the devolved ward budget, or the Ward Alliance
- 2) A priority for the Area Council in terms of influencing existing service provision, but not requiring investment from the Area Council's devolved budget for 2013/14
- 3) A priority for the Area Council which may be suitable for potential investment from the Area Council's devolved budget
- 4) A priority shared by other areas, which could lead to co-commissioning of some services with other Area Councils

5.5 It was also agreed that, because issues for young people featured so heavily in the emerging priorities, a presentation from the newly restructured Integrated Youth Support Service would be useful at the next Area Council meeting.

Usual resident

The main population base for outputs from the 2011 Census is the usual resident population as at census day 27 March 2011. Although the population base for enumeration included non-UK short-term residents, this population is analysed separately and is not included in the main outputs from the 2011 Census. All outputs, unless specified, are produced using only usual residents of the UK.

Occupancy rating

Occupancy rating provides a measure of whether a household's accommodation is overcrowded or under occupied. There are two measures of occupancy rating, one based on the number of rooms in a household's accommodation, and one based on the number of bedrooms. The ages of the household members and their relationships to each other are used to derive the number of rooms/bedrooms they require, based on a standard formula. The number of rooms/bedrooms required is subtracted from the number of rooms/bedrooms in the household's accommodation to obtain the occupancy rating. An occupancy rating of -1 implies that a household has one fewer room/bedroom than required, whereas +1 implies that they have one more room/bedroom than the standard requirement.

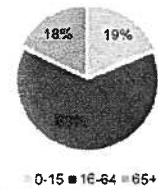

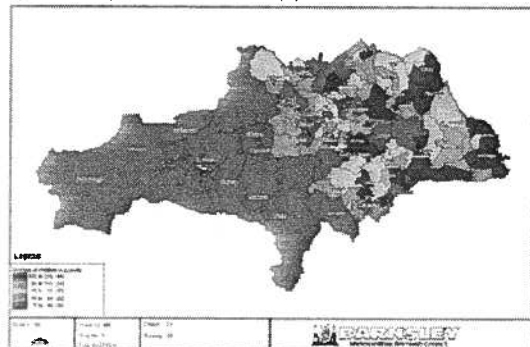

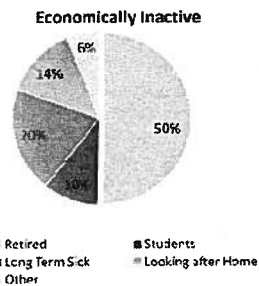

THURSDAY 1ST AUGUST 2013

1. **Present:** Councillors Stowe (Chair), Andrews, Key (from item 6), Lamb, Markham (from item 3), Morgan, Saunders, R. Wraith

2. **Introductions and purpose/outline for the workshop**

The Chair welcomed everyone to the workshop and asked those present to introduce themselves. Apologies were received from councillors Dures, Franklin, and Shepherd.

Before proceeding to the main business the group held a one minute silence to remember Wombwell councillor Denise Wilde, who had recently passed away.

3. **Presentation on available datasets for the south area**

The workshop received a presentation from Liz Pitt that highlighted some of the key challenges facing the area. The presentation was largely based on recently released data from the 2011 Census, supplemented where appropriate from other official sources.

Members learned that child poverty was relatively high in the area, exceeding the borough and national averages in Darfield and Wombwell. The group was concerned to hear that, whilst Key Stage 2 results were higher than borough and national averages in two of the four wards, outcomes at Key Stage 4 were below national averages across the whole area.

The reasons for the apparent drop off in pass rates were discussed, with members expressing concern about reported re-testing of pupils during their first year in secondary school. The group agreed this issue required further investigation, along with the level of support young people received during the important transitional period between primary and secondary education. It was noted that Rockingham Ward Alliance had already engaged with the head of a local primary and that Darfield and Wombwell members held joint meetings to discuss school issues, but the group agreed that ongoing constructive engagement with heads and governors was essential.

The group also heard that someone was living with a long term health problem or disability in over 30% of households in the area, and that 12.4% of residents felt their

day to day activities were limited a lot by poor health. In addition, members were told that almost 12% of adults provided some level of unpaid care, and that 3.5% gave more than 50 hours each week to such tasks.

The presentation went on to show that almost one third of adult residents had no educational qualifications, and fewer than 16% were educated to degree level. Members were particularly concerned to hear that the number of NEETs in Wombwell and Hoyland was higher than the borough average.

Members also learned that crime rates were a significant issue in Wombwell, with current activity focused on the High Street. Vacant commercial property rates varied across the area but exceeded 10% in Wombwell and Hoyland.

In closing, Liz Pitt informed the group that some of the information contained in the presentation was available at Lower Super Output Area (LSOA) level, which would enable members to identify individual estates where issues such as child poverty were of greatest concern. The Council was also working to overlay the Census data with its existing interactive mapping system, which it was hoped would be ready by the autumn.

4. **Context for priority setting and the Area Plan**

The Area Manager reminded the group that the Area Plan would have to focus on members' highest priorities, and be ambitious but achievable. Members needed to consider potential commissioning plans for next year, but also the ways in which the Area Council could use its performance monitoring powers to ensure existing service providers were held to account. Feedback from community consultations, and ward level plans and asset mapping, would also feed in to the priority setting process.

Members acknowledged that the area was facing significant challenges, but stressed that its successes should be celebrated. It was also agreed that boundaries between wards and other organisational entities, such as Safer Neighbourhood Teams, should not be allowed to act as barriers to improvement.

5. **Group discussions on priorities identified by Ward Alliances**

Following the whole meeting discussions outlined above, members broke into ward level groups to discuss their priorities in more detail. The following points emerged:

Wombwell

Priorities/key concerns

- poor private sector housing > multiple nuisances and anti-social behaviour (fly tipping, drug abuse, etc) > detrimental impact on investment
- new housing developments > shortage of primary school places
- quality of rented commercial premises, particularly on the High Street
- cleanliness
- enforcement
- sport and leisure provision
- youth provision (including facilities for disabled young people)
- parking at primary schools

Ideas for further exploration

- selective landlord licensing pilot (currently being tested in Sheffield)
- business rates, including potential for local variation
- transport connectivity (particularly between residential and employment centres)
- relationship with markets and town centre teams across the south area > potential for a dedicated area-wide town team, with enforcement powers (e.g. environment, health and safety)
- use of existing leisure provision (including Wombwell Sports Stadium and Advanced Learning Centres)

Rockingham/Hoyland Milton

- Census information reinforces new ward level priorities

Cross cutting themes

- worklessness > the economy
- educational attainment
- skills

Key questions

- what do we control?
- what can we influence?
- what can't we control or influence (and therefore should not spend time on)?

Information required

- localised educational attainment, to enable targeting of young people living in areas of low attainment
- long term sickness and unemployment by LSOA level, to enable targeting of specific areas

Darfield

Key points

- child poverty figures - do we need to do more?
- youth provision badly needed due to recent service cuts
- existing plan says older people should be 'active and involved', but also need to consider poverty issues
- aim to 'develop local hubs' needs to support welfare changes, including online applications and maximising claims. Also need more accredited IT courses

Delivery at Ward Alliance level

- Local hubs, e.g. for:
 - IT and other courses/access to equipment
 - local welfare rights/debt advice

- 8 to 13 youth provision (library)
- local youth provision, rather than asking young people to travel to Wombwell (need a secondary school representative on the Ward Alliance)

Possible commissioned activities

- welfare/advice hubs - CAB etc
- IT provision/other locality-based courses (roadshow model? volunteer tutors?) > courses subsidised, not free
- youth provision - 8 to 13 and 13+
- apprenticeships, possibly in conjunction with other Area Councils (economies of scale)

More information needed on...

- drill down on child poverty/IMD/information about older people by small area
- more access to and stronger links with secondary schools > information about re-testing and transition from Y6 to Y7

6. **Discussion on priorities**

The Area Manager led a whole group discussion on emerging priorities for the area as a whole. The following key themes emerged:

- young people
- business and the economy
- information and guidance

Within these themes, members highlighted the following issues:

- 11 to 16 attainment
- poverty (all ages)
- support for young people re. work/NEETs/opportunities - a range needed, including mentoring and links to businesses
- attracting other funding sources > need more officer support to attract inward investment
- junction 36 Enterprise Zone (business hub for larger employers) - need to influence
- encouraging businesses and individuals to be responsible for their own environment
- locally based welfare guidance/debt advice (roadshow model?)
- need to involve:
 - statutory and voluntary agencies
 - collectives/social enterprises - what already exists?
 - SY Credit Union
 - Berneslai Homes
 - charities (e.g. Age UK)
 - CAB
