
Sac.25.04.2014/7 - Appendix 1 **Planning to support your local area.** The South Area









As part of the Council's new approach to local area working arrangements, your South Area Council (represented by the Councillors for Darfield Hoyland Milton, Rockingham & Wombwell wards) has started the process of planning to support your local area.

To help us build a local approach, the first step in our planning is to work out what the main priorities are for the South Area. To do this we have been working hard behind the scenes to gather as much information as we can about the area, including information you might have told us as well as statistics such as the 2011 Census and other local information we collect within the Council. Some of this information is provided here for you to consider yourself.

This leaflet tells you about the priorities we have identified and explains a bit more about why we think these are the ones we need to be concentrating on, and gives you the opportunity to find out how you can be part of what happens where you live.

Improving our Local Environment

Why this is a priority :

- You told us that this is a top priority for you when you talked to us at the Ward Alliance, other local meetings, at our consultations at local events over the summer and through your councillors' surgeries
- We want to increase the sense of pride in our local area and to help everyone to take responsibility for where they live
- We have a lot of public green spaces which need regular maintenance and attention to improve the appearance of the area
- Increasing pride in our area means tackling things together we can provide the enforcement but we also want volunteers to take on environmental action themselves to help keep the area looking great!



Business and the Local Economy

Why this is a priority:

- Our area holds great potential to attract new business with excellent transport links, and space for development. There were 226 new business start-ups across the area in 2012, but we hold up to 10% of commercial properties vacant.
- We have two market centres within our area, a retail park and good high street shopping centres, we need to support our local retail centres to develop by attracting more people to shop locally.
- 5.2% of our population are unemployed (higher than the borough average of 5.1%), to support people into work we need to be encouraging more business in our area to create further job opportunities
- You've told us that building better links between local businesses, schools & the community is really important to you





Locally available Information and Advice

Why this is a priority :

Changes to welfare support are likely to have a big impact on people living in our area and we can support this through ensuring people know how to get the support they need. We know that:

- 5.3% of households contain families where there are no adults in employment (same as the borough average but higher than the national 4.2% average)
- 30.7% of households contain 1 person with a long term health problem or disability 5% higher than national average.
- 12.4% of people in the South area day to day activities are limited a lot, this is slightly lower than the borough average (12.6%) but higher than the National (8.3%) average.
- 7.9% of households within the South area contain lone parents higher than borough 7.8% and national 7.1% averages
- You've told us that getting access to good quality support & advice in your local area is really important to you



Opportunities for young people

Why this is a priority:


- We want young people to achieve their potential, we know that in 2 of our four wards there are a higher number of young people not in education, employment or training : Hoyland Milton=6.5%, Wombwell =6.9% compared to the Borough average of 5.5%, and 32.1% of our population aged 16+ have no qualifications.
- Under 16's Child Poverty in half of the wards within this area is more than 26%, higher than borough (25.8%) and the national (21.1%) average.
- At a number of events over the summer, you told us that good opportunities at 16 and better links between schools, businesses & young people was really important for our kids' futures



About the South area

The South area covers an area of 40 Km², and lies to the south and east of the borough of Barnsley, bordering onto Rotherham in the east and Sheffield in the South. The area has a population of approximately 45,076, 63.5% of whom are of working age (ages 16-64).

The area boasts two thriving market towns at Wombwell and Hoyland, as well as significant pockets of commercial activity and business development, served by excellent transport links via the M1 and the Dearne Valley link roads. Residential areas include both established and new developments as well as a number of traditional village centres. The area also benefits from protected green space, providing leisure opportunities as well places of cultural interest.
