Report of the Assistant Director of Regulatory Services to the meeting of the Statutory Licensing Regulatory Board Sub Committee to be held on the 12th November 2007.

LICENSING ACT 2003

APPLICATION FOR A PREMISES LICENCE The Grey Horse, Wellfield Road, Barnsley, S75 2ST.

1. Background

- 1.1 In September 2007 an application was received from Fraser Brown Solicitors for a variation to the existing premises licence for The Grey Horse.
- 1.2 Members are requested to determine the application for the Premises Licence.
- 1.3 The Grey Horse is a public house which is situated in a residential area on the outskirts of Barnsley town centre.

2 Existing Premises Licence

2.1 A copy of the existing Premises Licence is attached as Appendix 1 and covers the following activities:

a) The Sale by retail of alcohol

From 11:00 to 01:30 Monday to Sunday for consumption on and off the premises.

b) Regulated Entertainment

Licensed for Films, Indoor Sporting Events, Live Music, Recorded Music and facilities for activities similar to music or dance for indoors only from 11:00 to 01:30 Monday to Sunday

c) Entertainment Facilities

Facilities for making music are for indoors only from 11:00 to 01:30 Monday to Sunday.

4 Conditions of Existing Premises Licence

- 4.1 A meeting of the Statutory Licensing Regulatory Board was held on the 24th August 2005 to consider an application made for a conversion and simultaneous variation for above premises. The decision of the sub-committee was that the licence be granted in the terms sought in the amended application, subject to the following conditions:
 - Outdoor recorded music shall be limited to daylight hours only, subject to appropriate volume levels that will not give rise to public nuisance;
 - The rear car park shall not be used for the supply or consumption of alcohol, nor for the playing of recorded music;
 - Outside drinking areas shall be closed no later than 22:30 each day;
 - All doors and windows to the premises shall be kept closed during the playing of live music.

5 The Application for a Premises Licence

5.1 On the 19th September 2007 an application was made to vary the Premises Licence for The Grey Horse, Wellfield Road, Barnsley. The application is to alter the current layout of the premises as shown on the plans submitted as appendix 2, and also relates to the provision of Late Night Refreshment. The hours requested are for indoors only and are from 23:00 to 01:30

The application also includes non-standard timings for late night refreshment:-

If applicable, an additional hour to the standard and non standard times on the day when British summertime commences.

From 23:00 on 31st December to 05:00 on 1st January.

5 Promotion of licensing objectives

5.1 The applicant has set out in the application the additional steps intended to be taken in order to promote the four licensing objectives, if the proposed premises licence is granted.

a) General - all four Licensing objectives

The licensing objectives have been carefully considered in the light of the proposed variation taking account of the premises and their location.

The proposed variation will not alter the style and operation of the premises.

The proposed variation will promote the licensing objectives in accordance with the section 182 guidance.

The premises will operate in accordance with all relevant legislation.

b) The prevention of crime and disorder

As existing.

c) Public Safety

As existing.

d) The prevention of public nuisance

As existing.

e) The protection of children from harm

As existing.

6 Responsible Authorities

6.1 No representations have been received from any responsible authorities.

7 Interested parties

7.1 Following publication of the statutory notice of the application of the premises licence in the local press (a copy of which has been provided to the Licensing Section by the applicant) and the display of notices at the premises a

representation has been received from an interested party. The representation was

received within the 28 day consultation period.

Dear Mr Rowland

I wish to object to the granting of a variation to the licence for the Grey Horse Twish to object to the granting of a state of the following barriery. I am supported in this by ward members not on the Licensing Regulatory Committee.

The grounds of objection are that there is existing public nuisance and noise that has The grounds of objection are that there is existing public hursainte and horse that her existed for several years. This may get worse. The character of the surrounding area is quiet and residential, it is neither town-centre nor a main road. In fact the road structure would be unsuitable for large numbers of vehiculas to arrive and/or leave over a short period of time.

There would be no problem with the serving of food as a restaurant, which may have a beneficial effect in changing the type of clientel, but serving food until 1:30am must presumably be required to be in conjuction with entertainment. Clearing the ground floor will make a huge space available.

rigor will make a mage space available. The noise levels presently experienced are such that entertainment can currently be heard at the bottom of Kensington Road, 350 to 400 yards away. This is worse in the summer when windows are opened. Also the noise has been excacerbated by the smoking ban as clients are known to have wedged the outer doors ocen.

The loud rowdy behaviour of clients sitting outside seriously affects local residents and I have received several complaints about this. Not only are the noise levels from these people unacceptable but a public right of way passes immediately adjacent to the building and some residents are afraid to pass by. In addition the police have been called to attend on several occasions.

; have no objection to the changes to improve the public house in such a way that it to becomes more restaurant-like. What would be entirely unsurtable would be changes

that allow it to become a major entertainment attraction. The need is that conditions should be put in place, conditional on the licence provision, to prevent noise adversly affecting the neighbourhood, limit the number of cars attending and that the prevention of rowdy/loud behaviour is a management responsibility on or off the premises.
