Supporting Young People Outcomes from Youth Summit Nov 2019 and next steps



Area Council December 5th 2019



- Supporting Young People one of the five priorities for Penistone Area Council
- Since 2014 projects specifically supporting young people have included: Penistone Scouts, Penistone FM, Penistone Youth project (TYS)
- Approximately 6% of budget overall
- Other Area Council funded provision which has contributed to this priority has included: Countryside Skills training, Clean and Green contracts, Cycle Penistone, Sporting Penistone
- At PAC October 3rd 2019 current priorities were reaffirmed and agreement that as the last project supporting young people finished, it would be appropriate to investigate any further potential need in the area.

PAC support to Young People

Following discussion with, Targeted Youth Support – Early Intervention & Prevention, anecdotal evidence suggests some issues emerging currently in the area.

- Young People 'hanging around' nowhere to go
- Community perceived anti-social behaviour
- Young people under pressure perceived mental health issues

Agreed that this needs more investigation, taking young people as the starting point

Current issues for young people in our area

- Main purpose to consult with Young People through engaging activities
- Hosted by Penistone Grammar
- Organised through Penistone Area team and Targeted Youth support service, with the Youth Council
- Range of activities including taster workshops: boxing, rugby, art, dance, singing, nail art, cycle repair, climbing wall
- Information stalls; Chillypep, Happy Café, Penistone Parkrun, Samaritans, Substance Misuse


