Clean, Green and Tidy Service



This contract provides a service to help maintain a clean, green and tidy environment in the wards of Penistone East and Penistone West. The emphasis is to work with the community; incorporating volunteers, local businesses, parish councils and local schools to empower and enable a sustainable approach. The contract is now into a final 6 month extension ending at the end of September 2023 and now provides a team of 4 to the area two days per week on a rotational basis to ensure all groups can still be supported

Highlights

10 (Target 10) Groups and parishes supported. This has included both Twiggs led initiatives and demand from groups

➢ Groups worked with this quarter included: Spingvale community gardens, Wildflower bed management at HB+ and with Team Green Moor, Watermeadows park with clearance and bulb planting for next spring displays. Royd community gardens working with GXO logistics providing volunteer support as part of their corporate social responsibility, Silkstone care group and TPEG successful clean up at Wentworth Way industrial estate.











- The team supported 2 schools (achieving the target) this quarter with a number of activities. 2 Highly successful days with Hoylandswaine Primary School creating a wildlife habitat and woodland path where 32 pupils were actively involved in learning about conservation and making a positive impact on their school environment. 14 pupils from Penistone Grammar teamed with Springvale Gardens in activities to create wildlife habitats and support with greenhouse and polytunnel maintenance
- Volunteer numbers have fallen this quarter with only 53
 against a target of 150 and down from the last quarter of
 163 adult volunteers. This comes in spite of a higher number
 of proactive activities from the Twiggs team this quarter. It
 is becoming clear that volunteers are more likely to be
 maintained through regular group activities.
- The Twiggs team continue to receive positive feed back for work across our area through social media posts and the team continue to be appreciated by areas where this is just one volunteer such as Bromley Sprout House Well.

- Twiggs have proactively worked on a total of 36 projects this quarter in various locations across both wards working with volunteers if available. Projects have included path clearance along Roughbirchworth lane and Cawthorne village, hedge cutting and clearance in public seating areas at Howbrook, Gilbert Hill, Hoylandswaine, memorial clearance at Hood Green, and litter pick and clean ups in the Market Barn area (where volunteers unfortunately are still not forthcoming)
- 2 (target 10) activities working with businesses this quarter. This has seen a downward turn in engagement from businesses in the area in spite of attempts to continue to engage. Penistone leisure centre new staff have been engaged and work planned to maintain the area outside with volunteers. GXO logistics provided volunteers to support with Royd community gardens who have been struggling to recruit volunteers and Spar continues to be a major contributor of donations to support both volunteers and groups. A successful event was held with TPEG at Wentworth way industrial estate further attempts were made to engage with businesses there such as McDonalds for the future.

Social Action and Volunteering

Ageing Well in Penistone is the contract delivered by Age UK Barnsley to address loneliness and social isolation among older people in the electoral wards of Penistone East and Penistone West. The Service provides support at a one to one level through volunteer be-friending, helps to establish group activities with a particular emphasis on health outcomes, provides information and advice targeted to older people, special events and a community car scheme to help people access social and health activities and appointments. Two social inclusion workers are attached to this contract employed by Age UK Barnsley.

Highlights

- There have been 21 new referrals this quarter coming from social prescribing, SY fire service, social services and other medical professionals. All of these are seen individually by social inclusion workers. From these 3 now have volunteer be-frienders, and a further 6 are being matched. Other referrals are to groups activities, aids and adaptations, adult social care, councillor, safeguarding and other Age Uk services such as shopping, handyperson service and Dial-a-ride
- 30 established active volunteers in this quarter with 1 new volunteer all supporting through be-friending or support to groups
- Information and advice 9 new clients and also continued with follow up work from previous quarters with a further 10 clients. Benefits is the most popular enquiry with estimated gains of £40, 167 including one of £10,905. Highest demand from is from Penistone West.

- Community Car Scheme continues with 2 volunteer drivers, delivering 127 journeys.
- Men in Sheds continues to attract 25 members, averaging 9 per week for 15 hours with 4 new this quarter. Projects include planters, bird boxes and restoration of the bench outside the GP surgery in Penistone. Extensive work on the premises has also taken place. Promotion has been made via an interview with Radio Sheffield to explain the purpose of a Men In Sheds project.
- Groups continue to be popular in particular Millhouse green lunch club, New Inn pub lunch group and the new Boardgames group. However attempts to create a meet and greet group at Crow Edge have not be successful in spite of advertising, transport offers and a sloppy slipper event (only 3 turned up) Other self sufficient groups, Pilley, Wortley, Weavers court are still continuing although membership fluctuates.
- Links continue with U3A and regular referrals are made to various groups
- Age UK staff continue to support the Happy Vibes café on a fortnightly basis numbers are low as some service users have moved into care, Plans are in place to try and promote this more widely as it has a positive effect for those living with dementia and their carers.
- A successful intergeneration activity was organised this quarter in support of the Kings coronation. Young People from Greenworks Plus based in Silkstone invited members from the Happy Vibes group and Penistone Board Garmes to join them celebrate
- The Supporting Older People in the Penistone Area (SOPPA) group held a successful event on May 10th to provide information on services and activities for older people. Those who attended said they found it useful and services valued the opportunity to network.









Other additional support to this contract from Age UK (not funded by this contract providing added value)

Digital Inclusion – 1 new client from this area in the quarter receiving digital devise support and a referral to digital champions

Cost of living assistance -Clean and tidy project

This project has been competed this quarter. It has seen us identify **39 people in the area** who would benefit from the packs.

They **included 22 items for personal hygiene** and household cleaning and the aim is to offer support with hygiene poverty. These have been delivered by local volunteers.

Help Home From Hospital

This saw AUKB commissioned to support older people home from hospital after an overnight stay and offer ongoing support to anyone that didn't meet the Adult social care threshold for ongoing support. Such as social inclusion, to put in place a meal delivery, aids and adaptations referral, I&A advice and day services where appropriate.

36 people from this area received the service.

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Affordable shopping service

This service was set up after receiving feedback from many of our clients regarding how difficult they found it to do a weekly shop. Transport was an issue as was carrying their groceries. Online shopping wasn't an option as they didn't feel competent to do so. The Project Officers offer 3 parts to this service.

- Assisted shopping. Where they will transport the client and support them around the shop.
- Shop and drop. The client is contacted and a list provided. The Project Officer then does the shop and drops it off at their home.
- Online shopping assistance is also offered.

13 people accessed the service this quarter.


Handyman and gardening services

Our gardening service can be accessed for garden maintenance such as lawn mowing and hedge trimming.4 People from this area accessed the service.


The handyman service can put up curtain rails, help move/build furniture and other basic DIY tasks. 2 People from the area accessed this service.

Elizabeth activity & care centre and Ken Littlewood wellbeing suite

The wellbeing suite offers the services of a hairdresser, nail technician, massage therapist and foot care specialist. This is done in a clean, safe environment where even the most anxious of client can be put at ease. The Elizabeth Centre offers more intensive support to our clients as they move to that stage of their lives. A free day is offered in the centre to all prospective new clients.



The advice service has supported clients with a variety of different issues, but as in previous years, the most common are Benefits and Tax Credits, Debt, and Universal Credit. As well as improved financial outcomes the support provided by the advice service also helps to improve health and wellbeing, reduces client stress, and improve resilience by increasing the client's ability to cope through self-help. This is the first quarter of the new contract for CAB in the Penistone area.





- The service has continued to provide support via telephone, e-mail and website which does enable a great number of contacts, and appears to be a preferred method for many in the Penistone area.
- ➤ The actual number of enquiries has exceeded the target (39 per quarter) as a result. From the 56 contacts, 95 issues have been dealt with, of which 33% were benefits, 10% Universal Credit ,22% debt,19% housing, 7% health & community care, 3% utilities, 3% legal, 1% consumer,1% relationships & family and 1% other issues.
- Although it looks like many are direct benefit enquiries, this tends to be people who could be claiming benefit but aren't so may be initially seeking debt advice.
- ➤ Housing issues have been on the increase this quarter with increases in interest rates leading to higher mortgage and rental costs. .
- ➤ CAB are seeing a number of clients seeking food vouchers along with requests for help with energy costs. As they are part of the food bank project they can organise food parcels, but will then ensure fast track for debt advice support. Food vouchers can also be issued and CAB are supporting families with vouchers for school uniforms as necessary
- 29% of clients presented with a disability or long-term health condition during this quarter.
- The area manager has been working with CAB to look at returning to face to face deliver in the Penistone area. There is potential for space at Penistone Library for this to be offered once a fortnight, but with the service continuing to offer the non face to face support alongside this. This is unlikely to start until the next quarter so will be monitored as part of the quarter 2 performance reporting



DIAL help to reduce the financial exclusion of residents and work towards lowering anxiety. This is the second quarter of the new contract that started in January 2023.



Project Highlights

- 78 residents given telephone advice *not funded by Pensitone Area Council
- 36 residents attended outreach
- The total actual amount of unclaimed benefit income generated through the service to date is £109,179
- For every £1 invested from the Penistone Working Together Fund the project, including matched funding has brought £14.72 into the area

Added Value

- Matched funding contributed during the period to date £2,440.50
- 4 Penistone clients have received advice from our Warm Connections Team

Project Outcomes

- 81% of residents reported feeling less anxious as a result of speaking to our advisor
- 83% of residents reported feeling more able to deal with their own affairs

The service continues to support clients with significant health needs, and the majority of enquiries are for Personal Independence Payments although wider benefits are considered as part of assessment.

Although a telephone service and on-line enquiry support continues to be offered for the Penistone area, the funding provided by PAC supports the half day face to face appointments delivered in Penistone town hall.

Addition services also available from DIAL include the warm connections advice which can be delivered via home visits. These are increasing as people have become more in debt with energy bills

Quarterly updates

The workshops for the adults began in January and after a slow start of just 4 attendees, it has grown now to an established regular cohort of attendees

Tried different times and places as people requested weekend evenings and weekdays afternoons – the most successful at this moment is the 1:30 start at Cawthorne Village Hall. This time seems to suit retired people, or those whose children are at school and the 3pm finish suits them for collecting.

With the ones who attend regularly there have been successful workshops, demonstrating improvements on vocal techniques, confidence building, and many have already in a few weeks gone on stage and sang solos and sang in groups joining Educational Singers in their events.

Work is currently taking place on the singers to do their own event and they will be singing at the Penistone Area 10 Year Celebration in September at Wortley Hall.

The preparation for the exam is coming on well and it is expected that this will be taken towards the end of the year and a lovely supportive group has been established as a result

A volunteer has been enrolled who is on a gap year and she has been assisting and supporting singers, giving demonstrations and will be in September heading to Birmingham Conservatoire to study opera

Examples of Adults benefitting from the workshops

Case A

This man and wife joined us from the start of the workshops with absolute zero experience in singing. Both extremely nervous and no confidence they waited until the others had left and then got up and bravely sang a song each They then started to practice their chosen songs and scales in different rooms of the house and became part of the Penistone Arts Week production at The Penistone Paramount where they joined in the songs from the musical 'Les Miserables'



Case B

This lady joined our workshop after taking a break from her singing to raise her family She missed it very much but didn't have the confidence to join a group as she felt she couldn't sing or perform as she used to She has gained the confidence now to sing a solo now in the upcoming show in October at The Penistone Paramount and is looking forward to being entered into the ABRSM singing examination.

Case C

This young lady has gone from strength to strength since joining the workshop having no confidence at all but in the procession of a lovely voice, she would only sing at home. She joined us and took up the offer to sing in the That's Entertainment production at The Penistone Paramount for the Arts Festival where she sang and rapped at a solo from the musical Hamilton. She was so nervous she almost didn't go on stage but with support she went on and did an amazing job, she has also gone onto singing at The Sing For A King event in May where she performed Mr Blue Sky by Post Modern Jukebox, this version is extremely complex and has a big range which needs a bigger performance and Case C went on stage with the confidence she has gained and had a huge reception from the audience.

Case D

This gentleman has been a semi-professional singer back in the 80s and still loves to sing but found he didn't have the range or control he once had. He was suffering from a congested throat and with the advice we have given him he has a bigger range, and he now has much wider choice of songs and his general health has improved.

Through our breathing techniques and vocal warmups, he went back on stage in March after just a couple of sessions and sang in the "Les Miserables" section of That's Entertainment production at The Paramount Theatre for The Arts Week.

He is currently working on singing at The Paramount Theatre on our two productions SOS to the World and 21 Chester Place where he will have a solo and be playing a character from the Adams Family Musical

Supporting Young People Grant Fund

A second year of funding was allocated from PAC funds to support this grant in 2022. Four projects were successful in gaining funds to deliver 12 month projects to support young people in the Penistone area. All projects started in September 2022 and some delivered over a 9 month period in line with academic year



This is the final evaluation of the project for 2022/23. The project established links with the school who refer pupils for the one to one support and group work sessions. The school provides the project with a regular space upstairs near the school library and separate rooms in the Well Being Space for one to ones.

The final term focussed on more one to one work as well as group work with Y9 pupils and in particular a group of boys referred specifically by the school having been identified with risky behaviour

Y9 issues with young men

<u>anti social behaviour -</u> Shoplifting – arson – firearms – drugs – alcohol – vaping –bobby knocking aggression – fighting – issues in school – broken promises – health – parents in prison – family estrangement

The group of young men sent to us had had issues with several different forms of anti social behaviour and had been subject to police interviews

these were a great group of young men who had found themselves in trouble

they opened up to the team and spoke openly about issues that had led them to anti social behavior we discussed at length alternatives to all the issues discussed and spoke at length about aspirations and how they

see their futures

the group often felt let down by the school

two of the young men helped an elderly resident and were mentioned in the local newspaper – this was lovely to be able to take back into school to show them

the peer support within the group was fantastic

Issues supported in the one to one sessions

These continued as in previous terms and picked up on some of the following issues

- Estranged families these included issues with siblings / step siblings
 - Biological fathers coming back into the life of one young woman and the issues this caused her and her family –
 - paternity issues –
 - conflicting relationships -conflict with parents who work full time and doesn't spend quality time with children they feel all they do is chores around the home -
- Lack of Confidence this included public speaking especially having to speak in the classroom
 - worried about parents / friends views friendship groups
- Challenging behaviour in school this all linked back to issues happening within the family unit

Outcomes

During the last term the project suffered from some communication issues within the school and teacher strikes leading to reduced numbers of those anticipated at the outset. In spite of these set backs positive outcomes have been achieved for all the young people participating in the sessions with Ad Astra, through a variety of techniques:

- positive affirmations regarding behaviour and attitude -
- Understanding how issues at home can result in destructive behaviour in school and within friendship groups
- managing emotions and how they are often linked to the body cycle
- making more realistic expectations
- the young person's perspective had changed so this made life less anxious
- Linked emotions to sports analogies to help young men recognise links to mastering a skill and sorting out coping mechanisms
- spoke to school about how staff may be able to offer feed back about academic levels etc –
- one young woman needs additional support although she is improving weekly and managing her emotions well
- Improved group dynamics and more tolerance for different individuals
- Relating actions to real situations and Regret for actions

Penistone Grammar School

Supporting 50 students with a level 2 qualification in peer mentoring

Inspirational speakers in school promoting anti-bullying and positive wellbeing.







This is the final summary of the 9 month project which was about aspiring for the future and developing a culture of peer support within the school.

Outcomes of the project

Peer mentoring programme

- 40 students from years 8-10 started on the one-day training session on peer mentoring. Delivered in school but with the assistance of volunteer medical students (in their third year of training to become doctors).
- Peer mentors began mentoring from February half term.
- 40 pupils from years 8-10 successfully completed training and received accreditation in the RSPH (
 Royal Society of Public Health) level 2 mentoring qualification, and have been able to provide peer
 support to others within the school with low level mental health issues as part of a wider initiative
 within the school to help improve pupils' mental wellbeing.


Aspiring for the future

- External speakers were brought in to the school to help develop students' cultural capital (their knowledge of the wider world and developing skills beyond the classroom).
- Pupils have benefitted from diverse inspirational speakers from a range of backgrounds including Political leaders, authors and athletes who have challenged and informed pupils Examples included:

Simon James Green, a renowned author who spoke to students on a range of topics including how to become an author, LGBTQ+ issues and anti-bullying.

Dr. Marie Tidball, (pic right) an ex-Penistone student who is standing as Labour candidate for the Penistone and Stocksbridge constituency. She talked about inclusive leadership, representation in public life and being future change-makers.

Miriam Cates MP who spoke to our politics students about life as an MP as well as being probed on some of the current issues facing the nation.



This 12 month project provides singing workshops for young people in the Penistone area, to support young people to achieve health and wellbeing outcomes for all those who participate. The project provides professional learning and accreditation as well as the experience of live performances. Volunteers support with project and live performances have been raising money for the local area and supporting local venues.

We have been working on the next round of exams which were taken on the 26 27 and 10 July All had great feedback from the examiners and the 5 that took them received

This event is being attended by The Mayor of Barnsley and his consort, The Mayor of Penistone and a BBC singer who will be judges

This event is bringing much excitement and group chats are forming as the Teams battle it out We have also been invited to sing at outdoor festivals in August and are preparing for those individual singers and their songs of which some now will be singing up to 10 songs in their own.

Our volunteers are growing and working fabulous together, they meet and greet, sign people in Bake cakes and buns for fundraising, serve drinks on workshop days,go for any shopping, print off lyrics and help with setting up & clean up

They help with raffle prizes and have their own WhatsApp group which people are added to as they join, they set this up and run it themselves

Case Study One

It is great pride that we announce our Theo Hills who joined us in December 21 went all the way through to the Battles on The Voice Kids UK we worked with Theo through this process and he wanted both Adam and myself there in London when he was filming but unfortunately my father was gravely ill and passed away during this time so we couldn't go, but we were calling and FaceTiming and supporting him every bit of the way.

He has since gone onto gain a lead role in the national tour of The Full Monty where he will be working with stars from Emmerdale, Coronation Street and Eastenders

Theo is singing with us at the upcoming Festivals and is in Team Adam on the 1st October

Case Study Two

We invited one of our singers from the workshop to attend and sing at our gigs (dinner dance for on night Mamma Mia the second Grease) in Horbury the manager gave him a booking for later this summer and he has since gone and gained more contracts and will be singing with us again very soon

He also sang a solo The Mayor of Barnsley at his recent Civic Service

He also has auditioned for a lead role in a production of Les Mis and has been singing with the BYC and having a very successful summer busking of which we advised him on his equipment. This young man who is autistic is growing from strength to strength and his school teachers have contacted his mum to say how wonderful his singing is and entered him a national school talent competition in June.

He will be singing at the upcoming festivals and is part of Team Debbie 1st October

Case Study 3

This young lady has suffered with her confidence a lot due to the break up of her parents marriage. She also was bullied at school and now attends college, her confidence was also taking a hit due to her studying A level music and being told a teacher at the college that she 'just a singer!' We have shown her that being a singer is a walking, talking, breathing, happy, sad, instrument that you take everywhere and that is the only internal instrument and is totally irreplaceable. This really gave her a boost and she has gained top marks to the highest level in her first year.

She recently took her singing exam with us and gained a distinction with full marks on her two of her three songs

She is now wanting to sing more and recently went to the RNCM for an open day (which she was too nervous to do before) she love s it and is now working towards her Grade 8 which we will help her study in workshops showing others what is required

She is singing at the upcoming festivals and is part of Team Adam 1st October
